

I am incredibly grateful especially to Ivon, as he continued to coordinate the effort throughout the winter, and to Harvey Quackenbush who helped me in so many ways to minimize the impact of the construction on parishioners.

As always for projects this size, there are little glitches along the way. The engineer wanted a longer ramp with less slope, so more concrete, more rebar, and more time. We decided we wanted to increase the size of our upper landing and to eliminate the step into the Church which was a tripping hazard. So, we paid the extra money (well spent, we believe) to make that happen.

Of course, that changed the dynamic of our hand railings, and so the temporary wooden ones had to be installed. It was Ivon that sanded those (sorry for the slivers!) to make them safe, and Ivon also who has been working on sanding down the metal and repainting it. To save us money, he is working with a friend to weld the new pieces of railing to bring them up to code. That work continues.


As I write this, the final layer of aggregate has just been placed and compacted. Once the pumper truck has been booked, the final surface pour of concrete will be done. We then need only the installation of the handrails to be completed, and then it will be turned over to the Parish. At that point, we will landscape around the structure in order to soften its appearance and make it a lot more appealing. Craig and Judy Chaperone have already been planning which shrubs will work best along that cement wall, to hide it and make it more attractive. I look forward to working with them on that project this summer; they have done such an amazing job already in the landscaping of our front entrance.

I decided to write all this because I feel we have, in some sense, come to the end of a long journey. It really did begin over 27 years ago. Although an elevator sure would have been nice, at least we have something that we can afford that will still provide access for those who cannot climb stairs. I know many of you have been frustrated by the slow pace of work - I have been too, believe me. But here we are. It's nearly done. And no longer do I have to say to those who cannot navigate stairs: go somewhere else. No - come. Stay here. You have been an integral part of this family for so long, that we made making easier access to our worship space a high priority. If nothing else, saying that nobody is left outside is reason enough to build what we have built.

Our Parish Ramp

- A long journey nearing completion -

A Report from Fr. Michael



"Due to the absence of an elevator, or such a device (chair lift/platform), several parishioners are attending our neighbouring Catholic parishes of Holy Redeemer and St. Andrew the Apostle. Though we are not able to accommodate them in our parish building, we are grateful that other parishes are accessible."

This was the conclusion at the end of a process almost one year long that investigated the possibility of installing either an elevator or chair life/platform in our building in order to assist parishioners unable to navigate our stairs. The report, entitled "Chair-Lift Committee Findings" had been inserted in the Parish Bulletin on June 15, 2014. It continued:

"Though we feel it may be out of our possibilities to provide access, perhaps we need to find creative ways of continuing to journey with them in faith. Let us pray that we will get inspired and get creative in this situation. Perhaps on occasion a group of friends/parishioners could make a point of attending the other church with those who are attending another parish church and make it a special outing ... Please continue to offer your suggestions as we strive to keep connected with those who are unable to make it up our stairs."

After my arrival here, I learned this was not a new issue. Indeed, in our parish archives, we have the completed plans for an elevator design (dated 1992-93) that go back to Fr. Mulcahey's time here as Pastor. So, as far back as 27 years ago, this parish has struggled to find ways to allow better accessibility. My inquiries as to why the elevator build did not happen seem to point simply to Fr. Mulcahey's death in October 1993, and my inquiries as to the feasibility of a ramp seem to point to its impracticality due to the required length. With the 2014 report, it seemed all avenues had been investigated and shown to be too expensive or too impractical for us to consider.

Still, Sunday after Sunday after Mass, I stood at the bottom of the stairs and I looked at the height required, and I looked at the real estate we possessed and I wondered if a ramp were really out of the question. So, in fairness to the parishioners who could not navigate stairs, and in deference to those in wheelchairs that had to be carried into the Church for funerals and other such gatherings (has happened 3 times in the past 16 months), I put 2 proposals to our Parish Council at our meeting of April 4, 2018:

A ramp to our main entrance, or a much smaller and shorter ramp along the Rectory to the Meeting Room level where the Mass and other Liturgies could be streamed live onto a large screen television (done in other places, such as St. Pius X in Lively).

Ultimately, Parish Council opted for the main entrance option. Fr. Michael put Ivon Chaumont in charge of determining whether this was feasible and, if so, what it would cost. Ivon has extensive experience building large projects around the world, and he was happy to take this on. At our Parish Council meeting of May 23, 2018, he indicated that the ramp was, indeed, feasible. He presented 3 quotes for the project, with both him and the Parish Finance Committee recommending Laari Construction for the work. As the minutes of that meeting indicate:

"After reviewing the plan on site, and having ample opportunities to ask questions and receive answers for clarity, the PPC unanimously supports the plan, with Laari Construction as the builder. Their quote is \$70,000 plus HST. To clarify: the ramp is not intended to make our Church handicap accessible, but rather is to provide easier access for those who find climbing stairs difficult, and to allow easier access for pallbearers at funerals. Fr. Michael will now proceed to submit our proposal to the Diocese for approval."

That clarification re: not being designated as handicap accessible is essential, since we are unable to provide washroom access at the Church level. With that understanding, the Bishop gave us the green light to proceed, using the funds that we have saved. As the Finance Committee put it so well: "That money was saved especially for a project like this; if we don't use it for something like this, it makes no sense to save it for anything else."

Since we are now speaking of events less than a year old, everyone remembers the rest: construction began literally on the day of our first major snow storm in November, and continued through one of the worst winters in recent memory. Our contractor struggled, at times, with a turnover in staff - a common problem in our city. There was significant tenting and heating required. For a few weeks we had Church access only through our side door. Through it all, however, I am grateful for the patience and humour shown by all of you.
