A WORD FROM FR. MICHAEL

This weekend, the Sixth Sunday of Easter, marks the 10th week we Christians have been unable to gather as a community of faith. As I look around the world, despite the suffering this pandemic has caused and continues to cause, I note various signs of hope that seem to be emerging. Given the unpredictable nature of this virus, it's difficult to know if these hopeful signs are simply wishful thinking arising from the darkness of isolation and the various negative offshoots of loneliness, economic hardship, family turmoil and lifestyle disruption, or if there actually is light being seen at the end of the tunnel. From a Christian perspective, however, we know the light has never left us, and our faith allows us to walk in the firm conviction that Christ is fully present to us and to the world no matter what stormy seas buffet us. We need not look for light at the end of a tunnel, for it is not a tunnel in which we live. We live in the glorious freedom of God's light as His beloved children.

Our readings on Sunday speak this reality to us. In the first, the Good News continues to spread, bringing great joy in those who receive it, and the gift of the Holy Spirit enlivens the Church and those who belong to it. It is a reminder to us who have faith in Christ: fully lived, it brings that same gift of the joy. Psalm 66 reflects this, as it speaks of the joyful noise arising from all the earth as a response to the Good News of God's saving love.

In the second reading, Peter simply reminds us always to put Christ at the center of our lives; all else follows from this. Whenever we put something else at our center – power, pleasure, honour or wealth – joy is slowly siphoned away.

The Gospel points us both to anticipate the Gift of the Holy Spirit which we will celebrate in a couple of weeks, and to the reality of that same Spirit Who already dwells in us. Through the Spirit, we live in the Presence of God. That indwelling always manifests itself through love. It is a practical love, rooted in our concern for others, in reaching out to those in need, in building and sustaining community and through forgiveness of others. None of these traits can be stymied by a pandemic and the ensuing quarantine, for it is in the trials of life that the grace of love finds way to touch those in need of mercy.

I continue to marvel at the creative ways the love of God is manifested in your lives. Every moment is an opportunity to choose good or evil; life or death; others or self. It brings me great joy to see your choices for good, for life and for others. It tells me the Holy Spirit is real and active in your lives. What a wonderful testimony to your faith; to our faith. Halleluia!
